WHAT IS TEACH?

Teacher Education and Compensation Helps (TEACH)

The TEACH Early Childhood® Scholarship Program is a national, evidence-based strategy that makes higher education more attainable and increases staff retention and compensation for early learning educators. TEACH provides scholarships and support for recipients to earn credentials, college credits and certificates, and degrees in early childhood education or related fields. TEACH is a partnership between the scholar (early learning educator), the sponsor (their employer), and the TEACH Scholarship Program, whereby each contributes to the costs for tuition and related expenses.

Education

A specified number of hours in an approved early childhood credential or degree program is a scholarship requirement.

- ★ Over the last fiscal year, TEACH scholars took **25,496** credit hours.
- ★ TEACH scholars earned an average GPA of **3.49**.

Compensation

To support the economic viability of the state's early learning workforce, scholars earn a TEACH bonus and most receive an additional bonus or raise from their employer after the successful completion of a scholarship contract.

- ★ On average, the wages for TEACH scholars increased **8.41%** over the last fiscal year.
- ★ The median wage for TEACH scholars was **\$16.00 per hour**.

Workforce Retention

Scholarship requirements include a commitment for the scholar to stay with their sponsoring employer at least six months once their credential or degree program is completed.

- ★ The turnover rate for TEACH scholars was **4.4%** compared to a national average of **30-40%**.
- ★ **2,280** early learning programs sponsored at least one TEACH scholar.
- ★ **88%** of sponsors did not have to increase parent fees to sponsor a scholar.
- ★ **92%** of scholars found their child care employer supportive.

Counselors

Invaluable to the process, TEACH Counselors promote scholar success by providing academic, career pathway, and administrative support.

- ★ Counselors assisted **2,974** first-time TEACH scholars through the scholarship process.

Benefits to Florida Children

203,838 children were enrolled in early learning programs and family child care homes that employ TEACH scholars in Florida.

- ★ A majority of sponsors (**94%**) saw positive changes in the early childhood knowledge and skills of their TEACH participants.

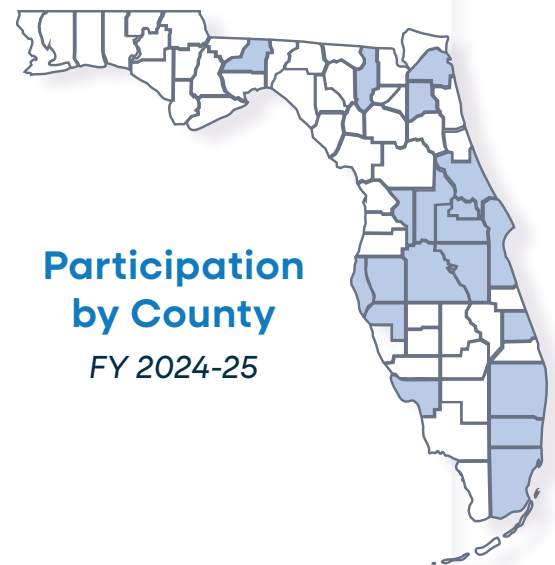
High School Career and Technical Education (CTE) Model

The CTE scholarship model offers high school students the opportunity to obtain a staff credential as part of their regular curriculum. Upon graduation, students have a better prospect for employment in early childhood and a step on a career pathway. Students are encouraged to apply for the National Child Development Associate (NCDA) credential as part of this program.

In fiscal year 2024-25, 1,143 students from 20 school districts participated in this youth-oriented scholar model, with 1,100 credentials completed or currently in progress.

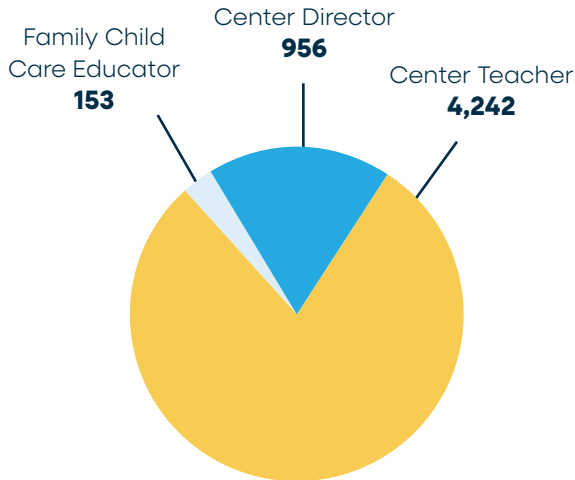
Along her educational journey with TEACH, Brenda has successfully completed 14 TEACH contracts, including earning her associate degree back in 2015.

Current Scholars by Provider Type:



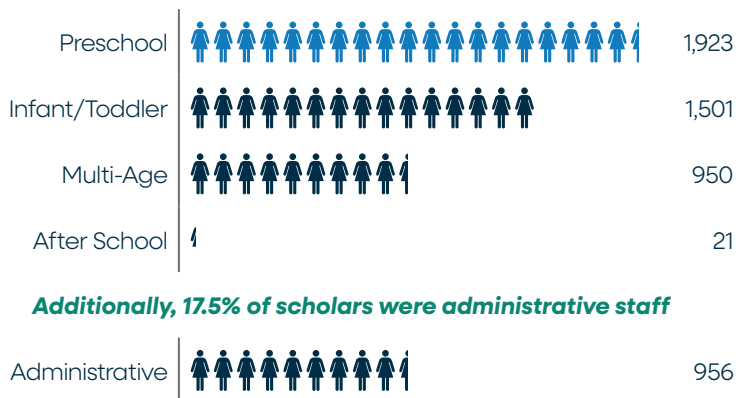
82% of scholars had direct teaching responsibilities

Program Type:



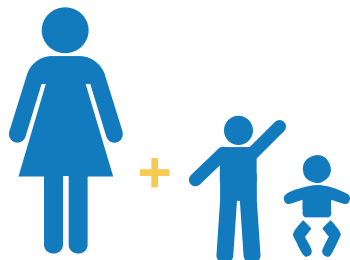
62% of sponsoring programs were for-profit businesses
